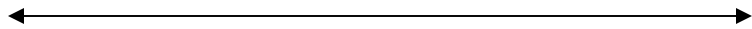

MARINE CORPS MARATHON NAMES AMATEURS VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR

(From the ARRL Letter, via Ian Millett, N3CVA)

On October 19, the Marine Corps Marathon announced that the Amateur Radio Service is its Volunteer Group of the Year in light of the 30 years of service and support hams have provided for the annual event. Amateur Radio volunteers began assisting with the Marine Corps Marathon in 1978 and have provided essential, mission critical communications to the medical staff on race day. The Volunteer Group of the Year Award was presented on October 26, as part of a special ceremony.

"The ham radio operators play a vital role in medical operations of the race. The knowledge and expertise of their dedicated volunteers enables the Marine Corps Marathon to provide all participants the highest level of emergency care and I am deeply appreciative of the hams' continued support," said Rick Nealis, Director of the Marine Corps Marathon

The award also recognizes two specific individuals, Rick Bunn, N4ASX, and Tom Azlin, N4ZPT, for their contribution to Amateur Radio participation at the Marine Corps Marathon. Bunn was first licensed in 1971 while in high school. He began volunteering for the Marine Corps Marathon in 1983 and served as the Marine Corps Marathon Amateur Radio liaison from 1997-2001. From 2001-2005, he served as the lead Amateur Radio operator, coordinating all aspects of ham radio support to the marathon. Azlin has been licensed since 1990. He first volunteered with the Marine Corps Marathon in 2001 and, since 2004, has been the Amateur Radio operator responsible for coordinating all aspects of aid station ham radio support.

JOTA – JAMBOREE ON THE AIR

This year is especially important for JOTA as it marks the 50th anniversary. Starting in 1958 it now draws more than 400,000 Scouts and their Guides together for this annual event. The Scouts and Guides set up a variety of Amateur Radio types and use them to exchange information. As communication technology changes, both the traditional and new digital modes are offered to Scouting so they can exchange such things as their location (QTH), first name, Scout Troop number and other interesting ideas via Amateur radio.

Exploring is a wonderful part of the scouting program and amateur radio provides an excellent opportunity to explore interesting places and meet new friends. Like the World Jamboree held each year, the JOTA also allows Scouts to meet and talk with other Scouts across the county or around the world.

The mixture of wilderness adventure and radio adventure works hand-in-hand with the goals of the program. The time soon comes to make QSOs with other stations; this makes it all worth-while to hear a voice or copy the CW or digital signals knowing other Scouts have done the same hard work to hear you.

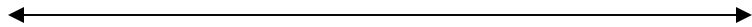
Pre-registration and pre-payment is *required* and is **non-**

ARRL Digital Conference

Sunday, November 11th at the Armed Forces Retirement Home at the corner of Upshur St, NW, and Rock Creek Church Road, NW, in Washington, DC. (38 degrees, 56', 31.5" W by 77 degrees, 00', 47.8" N)

The conference is sponsored by the [American Radio Relay League](#) with financial support provided by the [Foundation for Amateur Radio](#) and hosted by the [Armed Forces Retirement Home Amateur Radio Club](#).

From the preparation to the conclusion, JOTA opens the doors to the many facets of Amateur Radio and the Scouting Program. From preparation through planning and hard work, each Scout participates; in building an antenna, putting them into the air and selecting a suitable power source; connecting all the parts together while learning valuable lessons in such things as safety, good manors, good listening skills and teamwork.

The JOTA stations are controlled by FCC Licensed HAM operators, which are, in some cases members of the Scouting Program or HAM. This cooperation allows Scouts of any age to participate, with or without experience.

The author counted over 16 Echolink Conferences, 35 stations over eight bands from 80m through 6m. In the early morning around 5 a.m., many stations from Germany, Denmark and Sweden on lower HF. By 9 a.m. came the UK and Spain. By 11 a.m. the U.S. stations filled 40m, 20m and 15m. A few weak 10m and 6m local station could be heard. Most of the communication was concentrated on Phone with a few stations using digital and CW. So far no satellite Station communication, but AMSAT designates services for JOTA each year.

One station in North Carolina had 26 Scouts take turns talking to another station several hundred years away. Each Scout took turns introducing themselves by first name, the Troop they belong to and some of the activities they enjoy during JOTA. Later, a Commissioner, a liaison between many Scout Troops talked about his roles in the Scouting Program with other Scout leaders..

I had a conversation with Colin, a Guide for the Somerset Scout Troop of Taunton England while camping at the West Hatch Scout Camp. The Guide and station operator (GB0THW) was setting up and testing the radio equipment when we chatted. He said, "We have 20 Scouts & Clubs participating in orienting right now, soon to return to camp and later they will do archery, climbing and caving (in a made-man simulated cave)." Scout also partici-
